Because he worked briefly for the great Luminaire store in Coral Gables then started his own store, Glottman, in 2001 in the Design District. Because Glottman carries cool lines like Materialise.MGX lighting, (pictured below), Interlam paneling, Bosca door systems and Laura Meroni furniture. Because he goes to the Milan International Furniture Fair, 100% Design, Cologne, Maison et
